




A HIGHER CALL (Adam Makos) - Tuesday, September 3, 2013



THE VERY FIRST CHRISTMAS (Paul Maier) - MONDAY, DECEMBER 2 / 7:00 PM ONLY






BRIDESHEAD REVISITED (Evelyn Waugh) - Monday, January 6, 2014

This classic is perhaps even better known from film and television. During WW II Charles Ryder, a captain in the British Army, finds himself stationed at "Brideshead," a baroque castle that recalls England's prior standing in the world. Exhausted by the war, he takes refuge in recalling his time spent there, years earlier, with the family and heirs of Lord and Lady Marchmain. Ryder, a religious skeptic, experiences a family divided by their confusion over how British elite and religious belief fit in the modern world.




THOMAS JEFFERSON: THE ART OF POWER (Jon Meacham) - Monday, February 3 In this magnificent biography, the Pulitzer Prize—winning author gives us Jefferson the politician and president - a great and complex human being forever engaged in the wars of his era. Philosophers think; politicians maneuver. Jefferson's genius was that he was both and could do both, often simultaneously. Such is the art of power. From the writing of the Declaration of Independence to his complicated life at Monticello, Jefferson was central to the age.




THE STONE DIARIES (Carol Shields) - Monday, March 3

Daisy Goodwill Fleet is a seemingly ordinary woman whose life is marked by death and loss from the beginning, when her mother dies during childbirth. Through marriage and motherhood, Daisy struggles to find contentment and discover her life's true purpose. This is the only novel to win both the Governor General's Award (1993) for English language fiction in Canada and the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction (1995) in the United States.



CITIZENS OF LONDON (Lynne Olsen) - Monday, April 7

Here's a well-researched (and written) account of a group of farsighted Americans in London at a time when many of our leaders were still beset by doubt about a faraway war. This trio included New Englander John Gilbert Winant, railroad baron and later Governor of New York W. Averill Harriman, and famed newsman Edward R. Murrow. They saw isolationism as an ultimate menace to their own way of life and were convinced that in helping save London, they were saving America.



IN THE GARDEN OF STONE (Susan Tekulve) - Monday, May 5

Converse College faculty member won the South Carolina First Novel Prize with this story that begins near daybreak in War, West Virginia, when a train derails and spills an avalanche of coal over sixteen-year-old Emma Palmisano's home, trapping her sleeping family inside. The year is 1924, and the remote mines of Appalachia have filled with families like Emma's immigrant laborers building new lives half a world away from the island of Sicily. Here's a multi-generational tale about the nature of power and pride, love and loss, and estrangement and forgiveness. We hope to have the author as our special guest!



SILENCE (Shusaku Endo) - Monday, June 2

"Silence," an intense historical novel, is set in sixteenth century Japan, where Portuguese missionaries must contend with traders from rival European nations and the persecution of Christians by Japanese feudal lords who try to drive Christianity out of Japan by torturing priests into denying their faith. Shusako Endo meanwhile writes from within the terrible grasp of suffering the 'silence' of God through it all. We'll have a panel of invited guests to lead our discussion this time.
