#### COLLECT:

- Glass or metal bowl
- Small strips of tissue paper or other paper
- Pencils
- Candle



- 1. On your strips of paper, write down whatever is standing between you and God right now -- sins to confess, worries to turn over, parts of yourself that you wish to be refined.
- 2. Light the candle, and one by one, put each piece of paper in the flame, allowing it to burn.
- 3. Sing or meditate on the words from "Jesus Remember Me" (click for audio): Jesus, Remember Me, when you come into your Kingdom.
