

Many of you might be wondering, "What happened to the Faith Initiative to End Child Poverty? Did it just fizzle out?" I want to assure you that the answer is that no, it has definitely not fizzled out! In fact, the leadership team has been faithfully meeting, even throughout the months of lockdown, and Pastor Scott Neely from the Unitarian Universalist Church led a retreat with us over the summer. I want to share with you what we have been up to, and what we are excited about moving forward.

Our name, mission, and vision are clear: The Faith Initiative to End Child Poverty has the vision to end child poverty in Spartanburg, and our mission is to bring people together as a faith community to address racism and poverty. We celebrate this clarity and focus!

The Faith Initiative to End Child Poverty is focusing its action into four areas: Awareness, Relationships, Support, and Advocacy. As a group, Scott helped us see the bigger picture of the exciting headway we have already made in these areas, as well as helped us create action steps for each moving forward.

The Faith Initiative to End Child Poverty has already raised awareness in our congregation and in our community about child poverty. Starting with the Poverty Summit in April 2019, this initiative has continued to offer opportunities for our congregation to learn more about the challenges for those living in poverty in Spartanburg, including church programs, focus groups, formation of JustFaith groups, the Peace & Justice Taskforce, and more. Though Covid has limited opportunities for gatherings, we have

not lost enthusiasm about providing opportunities for education and conversation.

Another major area that we celebrate is relationships. Scott Neely said that it should not be overlooked or underestimated that our diverse leadership team has faithfully gathered with one another after all this time, bringing together voices and perspectives from five different congregations (Church of the Advent, Mt. Moriah, Macedonia Missionary Baptist, Life with Jesus Ministries, and First Presbyterian). The Faith Initiative to End Child Poverty has also gained recognition in Spartanburg, and we have been humbled and encouraged by the ways in which community partners have invited us to the table to offer a faith perspective in important conversations about education, financial stability, childcare,

and more. In the future, our hope is to offer a REI (Racial Equity Institute) training with multiple congregations and other opportunities to further build and strengthen relationships.

The area of support is still a work in progress. First Presbyterian Church has narrowed its focus for financial support so that every organization funded through local missions grants fits the criteria of working to End Child Poverty in Spartanburg. Our 2020 mission project for Cleveland Academy was in direct align-

ment with this initiative, and our 2022 project will be as well (see the back page for more details!). There are many smaller efforts that have bubbled up to support those in need, and we are hopeful that the Holy Spirit is guiding us as we figure out the next faithful steps.

The final area is proclamation: to tell the story of what God is doing through this initiative. This area involves all of us! The pastors can preach about child poverty from the pulpit, and we will continue to do so, but the most effective way to

spread awareness about this issue is for all of us to share with people in our lives about child poverty and why our faith compels us to take action. We invite you to join with us in this effort, as well as to continue to pray for the Faith Initiative to End Child Poverty.

## Do you want to talk about racial privilege in your faith community, but you don't know where to begin?

JustFaith is an intensive, small-group process for Christians looking to deepen their faith and connect their faith with action. Participants will explore how their faith should inform their response to their learning, as well as discern action steps for working toward racial equity in their own communities.

The Faith and Racial Healing program is a 9-week program with 2-hour long sessions that includes prayer, study, reflection, and dialogue. Though not a traditional Bible Study, JustFaith uses the lens of the Gospel to help participants deepen their understanding through reading books, watching videos, and engaging in small group discussion. Faith and Racial Healing is the second part of a three-part series, but it is a complete program in itself. Anyone is welcome to participate!

#### An Update from the Peace and Justice Taskforce

One of the goals of the Peace and Justice Taskforce of First Presbyterian Church Spartanburg is to provide educational opportunities for our congregation, both within and outside of the walls of our church, to help each of us grow in understanding of the complex issues surrounding our faith and equity. These topics are often hot-button conversations that divide us. When we seek to learn, we are opening ourselves to understanding.

For Februrary, we are highlighting the Equal Justice Initiative in Montgomery, Alabama. The EJI, founded in 1989 by lawyer and author Bryan Stevenson, is a non-profit organization providing legal representation to people who have been illegally convicted, unfairly sentenced, and abused in state prisons and jails. The EJI provides assistance to formerly incarcerated people and challenges the death penalty and excessive punishment. The EJI's main focuses are on criminal justice reform, racial justice, and public education and awareness through their museum and memorial. In 2018, the EJI opened the Legacy Museum: From Enslavement to Mass Incarceration and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice. The Legacy Museum provides visitors with a comprehensive history of the United States' legacy of slavery. The Museum walks visitors through the transformation of Transatlantic Slave Trade to lynching to codified racial segregation (the Jim Crow Era) to mass incarceration.



At the National Memorial for Peace and Justice, there are markers for each county in the United States where a lynching took place. After touring the Memorial, visitors will see the duplicate markers set aside for each county to bring home, as part of the EJI's Community Remembrance Project. While Spartanburg County has not yet claimed their marker, Greenville County and Union County have gone through the extensive process to claim the markers. #### Thank you from Witness Season 2021


Dear First Presbyterian Church,

## WITNESS SEASON 2022 Angels Charge Ministry

Angels Charge Ministry offers a transitional housing program, case management, and advocacy to deter recidivism and to facilitate a healthy and productive re-entry into our community for women during and after incarceration. While in this program, the women receive help with GED and adult education enrollment, counseling, job skill development and job searching, and transportation.

Angels Charge Ministry is requesting support to help purchase a large van to provide reliable transportation for our residents. We currently have two old minivans that seat six people each. These vans have high mileage and continually break down making it difficult to get our residents to work & appointments on time. Without access to reliable transportation, our residents face difficulty in keeping their jobs if they are late to work. Our transitional homes are in neighborhoods that have little access to public transportation and essential resources (grocery & drugstores, banking). It is critical for us to provide safe, reliable transportation for our residents in order to help them succeed.

By the end of 2022, our housing will increase from 2 homes to 5 homes with beds for a total of 29 women! This is an amazing time of growth for us. YOUR help with purchasing a van is needed more than ever to help the women we serve as they make the transition from incarceration to success. We are grateful for YOUR support.

\*This project aligns with the Faith Initiative to End Child Poverty, as most of the women in this program have children. Supporting mothers with sustainable employment is critical for the success of both the mother and the child. Our goal for Witness Season is to raise a minimum of \$25,000 to help with the purchase of a reliable van.
