And even with all my artwork hung up there is still empty space waiting patiently for something new to be hung.

We rely on the pictures and stories of our past to help guide us in our present, but we also recognize in those yet-to-be-filled spaces that by God's grace there is still so much yet to come. The books and pictures and knick-knacks tell the story of where we have come from and simultaneously the empty space holds our hope for all that is still ahead. 

From the Peace and Justice Taskforce

Amos 5:24: But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

Celebrate Juneteenth in Spartanburg! During the 1840s, several of America's largest denominations, including the Presbyterian Church, faced internal struggles when they could not reconcile the issue of slavery and the federal union 'Emancipation Proclamation'. On June 19, 1865, about 2 months after the Confederate general Robert E. Lee surrendered at Appomattox, Va., Gordon Granger, a Union general, arrived in Galveston, Texas, to inform enslaved African-Americans of their freedom and that the Civil War had ended. General Granger's announcement put into effect the Emancipation Proclamation, which had been issued on Jan. 1, 1863, by President Abraham Lincoln. Juneteenth is a federal holiday in the United States commemorating this important day and the emancipation of enslaved African-Americans. Originating in Galveston, Texas, it has been celebrated annually on June 19th in various parts of the United States since 1865. This unique educational event in Spartanburg will celebrate the African-American experience since the end of slavery in 1865. Expect a weekend full of food, fellowship, the opportunity to learn via inspirational performances, and much more!

Do you want to talk about racial privilege in your faith community, but you don't know where to begin?

JustFaith is an intensive, small-group process for Christians looking to deepen their faith and connect their faith with action. Participants will explore how their faith should inform their response to their learning, as well as discern action steps for working toward racial equity in their own communities.

The Faith and Racial Healing program is a 9-week program with 2-hour long sessions that includes prayer, study, reflection, and dialogue. Though not a traditional Bible Study, JustFaith uses the lens of the Gospel to help participants deepen their understanding through reading books, watching videos, and engaging in small group discussion. Faith and Racial Healing is the second part of a three-part series, but it is a complete program in itself. Anyone is welcome to participate!


